The annual reports that are generated will help leaders determine the extent to which the efforts are having an impact on the local residents. The reports are also a way for the the various towns in Western Kansas to pursue grants to help further their local efforts.








Confidence In Our Local Economy






10 Year Shift in Local Jobs































Confidence In Our Local Community




Portion of the community that is highly confident on the listed community dimensions (Rating range: 0-7)



























Community Priorities

Priorities Summary:

The survey reveals that residents prioritize economic and community development, particularly in creating job opportunities, supporting local businesses, and enhancing infrastructure. Health and safety are also critical concerns, with a focus on maintaining a vibrant and resilient community. Engagement from residents in shaping these priorities is seen as essential, with an emphasis on inclusive leadership and transparent decision-making processes.





Vibrant Place: Residents value maintaining a vibrant community by focusing on public spaces, recreational facilities, and cultural activities that enhance quality of life. Investment in these areas is seen as critical to fostering a strong sense of belonging and community pride. Emphasizing aesthetic improvements and creating more social spaces are identified as key steps in ensuring the community remains an attractive and welcoming place.

Resilient Economy: Economic resilience is a top priority, with a focus on diversifying the local economy and supporting small businesses. Respondents stress the need for job creation and training programs to prepare residents for future opportunities. Attracting new industries and fostering entrepreneurship are seen as essential for maintaining economic stability and growth in the face of changing market conditions.

Engaged Citizens: Engaging citizens in community decision-making is highlighted as crucial for ensuring that leadership decisions reflect the needs and desires of all residents. There is a call for more transparent processes and opportunities for involvement in leadership roles. Strengthening communication between leaders and the community is seen as a vital step in building trust and fostering a collaborative environment.



Number of Participants




The largest demographic captured in the survey is long-term residents, many of whom have lived in the community for over 10 years, reflecting a deep-rooted connection to the area.

Gender




Male respondents tend to prioritize economic stability and safety, while female respondents emphasize the importance of community engagement and social well-being, highlighting differing perspectives.

Age Profile




Older residents are more concerned with maintaining the community's current quality of life, while younger respondents are focused on economic opportunities and social engagement.

Residential Status



Education Level




Employment Status




Employed respondents tend to prioritize economic growth and job stability, while those not currently working are more concerned with social support systems and community engagement opportunities.
